Sporting a familiar-sounding title (as 'Adam's Hit Parade' from 1960, and the February 1962 'Helen's Hit Parade' on Columbia), this, the first Cliff EP release of the year, like 'Cliff's Silver Discs' in 1960 [**EP** 7], sought to capitalise on his achievements in the singles market, which were by now considerable: he had nine Silver Discs to his credit, as annotatator Nigel Hunter pointed out, highlighting too the triumphant tour of Australia and New Zealand, "with rave reviews of their concerts appearing in even the more staid Australian newspapers ...". The four singles in question, released between November 1960 and October 1961, comprised a Number One (*I Love You*) and three Number Threes; the A-side of the latest of these, *When The Girl In Your Arms*, did not involve The Shadows.

This issue duly made it to fourth place, though it was not nearly as strong as the chart-topping 'Cliff's Silver Discs' referred to earlier and did not stay there for long: 3/10 March, behind 'Spotlight', 'To The Fore' and 'Helen's Hit Parade' (Helen Shapiro), this last going on to enjoy far more success than Cliff's similarly-titled release. 'Cliff's Hit Parade' in fact was destined to spend week after week lurking in the lower reaches of the EP charts. — For *MM* likewise 4 was its peak position, but according to this Top Ten Cliff held on for 22 weeks.






Both Australia and New Zealand issued home-grown copies, but Australia provided fresh artwork (I). The closest analogue to our EP otherwise is Portugal's 'É a altura de amar' which offered all but *I Love You* (II); so too a 'Cliff Sings' from Singapore/

Not all of them. One reporter exclaimed that Cliff, labelled 'The boy of the moment!' in concert posters, "can't carry a a tune and has little talent as a contortionist ... the show blasting to a close with Mr Richard still mumbling and writhing" (quoted by James Mc Skimming, op. cit. p. 1).

Malaysia, but this is most unlikely to be an authorised release (III). Individual tracks crop up on other EPs worldwide, for example *I Love You*, appropriately enough, on South Africa's 'Cliff In Love' (IV), *Theme For A Dream* (the most popular track of them all) on India's 'Great Hits Of Cliff Richard' (V), and *A Girl Like You* on 'Cliff Richard' from Denmark and Sweden (VI). That and *I Love You* are found together on 'Theme For A Dream' (Italy: VII) and 'Gee Whizz [sic] It's You' (France; VIII), *A Girl Like You* plus *When The Girl In Your Arms* on 'Cliff Richard' (France again: IX).









Four Shadows in silhouette framed by a yellow spotlight — an eye-catching front pic for yet another high-flying EP. Further hit singles had been accumulated the year before in the wake of *F.B.I.*: the three A-sides (spanning April-November) together with the flipside of *The Savage* made for a winning combination despite the relatively poor performance of *The Savage* itself<sup>3</sup>; *Kon-Tiki* was a wholly deserved chart-topper, *The Frightened City* climbed only to 3 in the face of such formidable contenders as Elvis Presley's *Surrender* and more especially Del Shannon's inspired *Runaway*. As James Wynn pointed out in his incisive sleeve notes, the record showcases the talents of Norrie Paramor, who penned three of the four tracks, with another accomplished tunesmith, Michael Carr, furnishing the fourth, *Kon-Tiki*, one of the group's most popular numbers. Add to these the earlier *Bongo Blues* and *The Miracle*, a majestic number from 1964 (co-written with Carr, serving as a B-side to the frivolous *Rhythm & Greens*), and there you have Paramor's total contribution as composer to the group's recordings.

Released early in the year, 'Spotlight' was the first of a run of five EPs, the last of which (EP 24, 'The Boys'), like this, reached the top spot. The 59 weeks on chart was way behind the scores attained by 'The Shadows To The Fore' [EP 12] and 'The Shadows' [EP 8], but was still impressive, roughly comparable with 'Cliff's Silver Discs' [EP 7], which attained 57.

The competition. 'Spotlight' penetrated the Top Ten (at 7) on 17 February, then moved to second place behind 'The Shadows To The Fore', hitting Number One for 3/10 March (ahead of 'To The Fore') and for 17 March (ahead of Helen Shapiro's 'Helen's Hit Parade'). Shapiro reversed the positions for the following three weeks, then it was 'Spotlight'/ 'Helen's' for three weeks, 'Spotlight'/ 'To The Fore' for one, 'Spotlight'/ 'Four Hits And A Mister' (Acker Bilk) for a further one, until (on 19 May) 'To The Fore' pushed 'Spotlight' back down to 2. The latter was to make 2 again on 9 June (behind 'Hits From 'The Young Ones'), and 3 on 26 May, 16 June and 23 June.

MM as usual had a rather different take: at 1 for an unbroken run of fifteen weeks between March and June, in their Top Ten for 36 weeks in all, running from February to October and re-emerging for the following January-February.





It was a disappointing performance, only just making the Top Ten. We know that The Shadows did not want this track as a lead single but were overruled by Norrie Paramor, who may well have been thinking of it as useful advance publicity for the coming film (premiered 13 December) and its associated album — a supposition reinforced by its very speedy release as the follow-up to Kon-Tiki, which had appeared less than two months before. Whatever the truth, The Savage was the only available candidate for a single at that juncture, as the dissatisfaction surrounding Wonderful Land would not be resolved until January. The Savage has now of course joined the ranks of Shadows classics. The fact is that not everybody back then found The Shadows in frenetic mode appealing —and The Savage is most certainly that: that is why The Stranger would have fared far better chartwise had it been the lead track from the outset with Man Of Mystery firmly relegated to a subordinate role. The February single calmed things down again, and look what happened then.

The EP was taken up by Australia (with different colouring: I) and New Zealand as well as India. *The Savage* and its flipside are naturally recurrent: on Denmark's 'Got A Funny Feeling' (II), Spain's 'The Shadows' (III), France's 'The Savage/ Wonderful Land' (IV) and Portugal's 'The Shadows' (V). — *The Frightened City* with *Kon-Tiki*: 'The Frightened City' (France and South Africa: VI–VII), 'I Want You To Want Me' (Portugal: VIII) and 'The Shadows' (Argentina: IX). Then there is *The Frightened City* alongside *The Savage*: 'The Shadows' (Mexico: X).



This release, originally marketed without specifying 'No. 2' (see above for both issues; for 'No. 1', though it was never actually called that, see **EP** 8), like 'The Shadows No. 3' released a couple of months further on, offered four tracks (in both cases three instrumentals and one vocal) from the enormously successful debut album of September 1961, which was still riding high in the Top Ten. Each of the back covers incorporated (slightly different) extracts from Cliff Richard's original annotation; in the second version the reference to the group ("whose recording sessions are something like a civil war") having "almost turned his [Norrie Paramor's] hair white overnight" is dropped. Still, if the "fly on the wall"element seems more than slightly overdone, the singer does have some positive things to say (in a not altogether straightforward way) on the subject of his group's abilities as vocalists and players.

The chart performance of this pair did not even come close to emulating that of the LP, 'No.3' disappearing from view very rapidly, and Columbia did not persist with a third set, choosing to bring in singles material, notably the smash hit *Wonderful Land*, for the follow-up in August (**EP** 23). However, two more numbers would be called upon to fill out 'Shindig With The Shadows' in December 1963 (**EP** 35), bringing the total used to ten of fourteen. Of the unrepresented tracks — *Blue Star, Find Me A Golden Street, That's My Desire* [vcl], *My Resistance Is Low* — only the first would put in a second UK appearance, on the 1981 6LP set 'The Shadows Collection' (EMI Stereo World Record Collection SM 721–726).

In general the UK market was pretty well disciplined when it came to differentiation in assigning titles to vinyl product, unlike Spain for example, which turned out one 'The Shadows' after another, caring nothing about discographical niceties or even customer confusion.

In line with this MM with its Top Ten EP Chart has no trace of either.





It was now the turn of the (one-week) chart-topping LP '21 Today' (released October 1961 in mono, the next month in stereo) to be excerpted. Any EPs derived from such a momentous but transitory event could hardly be emblazoned with the same title, hence this dullest of substitutes; clearly sometime before initial release in April it had been resolved to put out a second or more from the same source album.

To that the group had contributed one track of their own, and had backed Cliff on ten of the remaining fifteen. The present issue, which failed to chart, and its follow-up in June, which stalled at 19, took in between them six of the ten, leaving four worthy joint efforts unrepresented: Tea For Two, Without You, My Blue Heaven and Shame On You.


A further release could have been slotted into, say, August, but neither 'No. 1' nor 'No. 2' had made anything like a profound impression anywhere and the next EP turned out to be a hits collection, appearing in November (**EP** 25), the intervening gap having been filled more than satisfactorily by two Shadows EPs. 'No.1' and 'No. 2' sported the same sleeve notes from ("a note by") Derek Johnson, i.e. an adaptation of the more extensive annotation used on the parent album. There is plenty of praise heaped upon Cliff's achievements in the world of entertainment, but we hear nothing about what either of these EPs had to offer.



Leaving aside certain Malaysian and more particularly Thai EPs the authenticity of which is to say the least questionable, Italy ('Anema e core': I) and Spain ('Cliff Richard': II) picked up three and two respectively of the numbers covered by our two EPs. Individual tracks: Forty Days on 'The Young Ones' (Denmark Sweden; Finland with different cover and running-order: III–IV) and 'Cliff Richard' (Japan: V); Poor Boy on 'Cliff Richard And The Shadows Again' (Germany: VI); Y'arriva on 'Cliff Richard' from Spain (VII) and Sweden (VIII). Finally here, for Columbia SEGS 92 Sweden took over the artwork of 'Cliff Richard No. 2' but programmed it differently, with I'm Lookin' Out The Window/ Do You Wanna Dance/ How Wonderful To Know/ 50 Tears For Every Kiss.

Other EPs worldwide dipped into the four group-accompanied tracks bypassed by the UK EPs.

A spin-off from the top-selling LP, released in December 1961 in mono, the month after that in stereo. It took the sensible step of presenting all four of the numbers from Cliff and The Shadows (nothing about them in the superficial uncredited sleeve notes), with no recourse to a 'More Hits From ...' as there would be with both 'Summer Holiday' and 'Wonderful Life'. Not that the term 'hits' is misused here as is sometimes argued: songs culled from a No. 1 album are themselves 'hits' by definition. Those who cannot see past hit *singles* may minimise their irritation in this particular case from the circumstance that the title track (in a variant version) and its punchy B-side *We Say Yeah* had climbed to the top of the singles charts and *Got A Funny Feeling* had served as the flipside of the No. 3 *When The Girl In Your Arms*.

By 26 May this collection had made it to 4 with 'Helen's Hit Parade' (Helen Shapiro), 'To The Fore' and 'Spotlight' lying ahead of it. For the next two weeks it sat at I, Elvis Presley's 'Follow That Dream' deposing it on 16 June (the same 1/2 persisted for three further weeks). It last appeared in the Top Ten on 13 October.

'The Young Ones': given the film's success it is no wonder that uptake of the core Cliff and The Shadows numbers was extensive on all three vinyl formats, so it is worth looking closely at their influence on the EP market, leaving aside only certain Malaysian and Thai releases (in the latter the use to which this material was put reached comic proportions).

(i) Australia (Columbia SEGO 8159, cf. McSkimming op. cit. p.6) and New Zealand (Columbia SEGM 8203) took over the EP as it stood but the former gave it new artwork :



Wonderful Land/ Midnight/ Stars Fell On Stockton/ 36-24-36







Back to singles tracks for this release, but with *Guitar Tango* issued just the month before, the only feasible A-side available for use on EP was *Wonderful Land* from February. Both *Midnight*, taken early on into the group's stage repertoire and played quite often on radio, and 36–24–36 possess real merit and have proved to be enduringly popular with Shadows devotees — not that Keith Goodwin had anything to say about

them one way or the other in his sleeve notes, though he did provide a list of achievements in the recording field between *Apache* and *Wonderful Land* and pointed to recent personnel changes, voicing the reassurance that "the sound and style of the group hasn't [sic] changed". Whatever their instrinsic merits however, in such a fiercely competitive climate the weighting of three Bs (which committed fans would already possess) to a solitary A must have played a part in keeping it out of the Top Five, particularly as the hit in question had already made its way into so many record collections. When it climbed to 6 for a second time in mid-November 'The Boys' was securely lodged at the top with a trio of popular male vocalists (Elvis, Billy Fury, Karl Denver) sitting pretty between them. Its life in the Top Ten stretched, with some interruptions, from 29 September 1962 to 2 March 1963. In *MM*'s Top Ten, where it also got to 6 and no further, it hung on into March, with 24 weeks on chart overall.

Australia and New Zealand had their own pressings (Columbia SEGO 8171/ SEGM 8171, illustrated below), and once again it was New Zealand (and India too on this case) that stuck to the original artwork, which sported a shot from Edgar Brind, a few of whose generally rather austere portraits found there way on to various continental front covers. Australia adopted a different design, one quite properly picturing Jet Harris rather than Brian Locking (Brian Bennett had some claim to inclusion as contributor to *Stars Fell On Stockton*).





Combinations of tracks: *Wonderful Land* and its flipside furnished a natural pairing: 'The Shadows' (Denmark Sweden: I); 'The Savage/ Wonderful Land' (France: II); 'The Shadows' (Spain: III). *Midnight* and 36–24–36 occur together on another Spanish 'The Shadows' (IV).

#### Individual tracks:

- Wonderful Land: 'Guitar Tango' from Italy (V); yet another 'The Shadows', and a late one, from New Zealand (VI); and another, from Portugal (VII);
- *Midnight*: 'F.B.I.' (France: VIII).

The Top Five single *Guitar Tango*, released back in August, was just vacating the Top Twenty, while the No. 2 *It'll Be Me* from Cliff and the group, released that same month, was still in contention when The Shadows came up with a wealth of fresh material in the shape of an LP and an EP, both of which made it to the top of their respective charts —

the last EP and the last 60s LP to do so. The set, associated as it was with the Galaworld film of that name, was treated as a special case to the extent that it was the only issue among the ten EPs from 1962 considered here to be put out in both mono and stereo. What nobody thought to supply was any sort of explanatory text, a deplorable omission.

By 27 October 'The Boys' had climbed to 2, with Elvis' 'Follow That Dream' in its twentieth week at the top. The next week Elvis was overtaken, and The Shadows held their ground for two more weeks with Elvis' 'Kid Galahad' pressing them hard. On 24 November the latter moved past them, and the same 1/2 persisted for three more weeks. After a two-week dip to 3 then 4 prior to New Year, 'Kid Galahad'/ 'The Boys' appeared at 1/2 on 5/12/26 January, The Shadows having been pushed from 2 to 3 on 19 January by 'The Sounds Of The Tornados', a sequence that recurred on 31 January. 'The Boys' would climb to 3 once more, behind 'Kid Galahad' and 'Frank Ifield's Hits', on 9 March. It paid a final visit to the Top Ten on 22 June.



*MM*'s Top Ten (up to the end of May, when it was discontinued) had them in occupation for 31 weeks, and at *I* for no fewer than six weeks continuously (the whole of November and first half of December).







Another hit collection; this, like the earlier 'Cliff's Hit Parade' [EP 16], incorporated one track without The Shadows. For the first time on a Cliff Richard EP, two singles pairings were on offer, *It'll Be Me* (which was taken into the album '32 Minutes And 17 Seconds With Cliff Richard' of October, so generating the relatively rare bonus of a single track in stereo guise) with B-side *Since I Lost You* from August and the other two songs — a double A-side — from May. Both had climbed to Number Two (the obstacle to further progress in both cases being Elvis Presley), but this spin-off made no impression on the charts. Derek Johnson's sleeve notes for a change went beyond a glowing tribute to give some helpful background information on the songs included in the set.

Auastralia and New Zealand took up these EPs, both retaining the artwork; differently Spain with 'Cliff Richard' (I), both in the cover shot (cf. **EP** 14, here reversed) and in the running-order. Other countries worked these numbers on to EPs:
