

The first of six Shadows EPs for 1963. 1962 had been a desperately poor year for stereo releases; this latest batch saw stereo alternatives for seven of the dozen, the mono-only issues predictably revolving around singles in the main — 'Los Shadows' [EP 33] deserved better. As in the previous year, two of the group's EPs drew on a top-selling LP, this released back in October 1962 but still a commanding presence in the Top Ten. 'Out Of', by far the more successful of the two EPs, offered three instrumentals and one vocal. 'Out Of No. 2' was purely instrumental. Its release came rather late in the day, a differently sourced set [EP 28] having been interposed in March; it and 'Dance With The Shadows' [EP 41] from 1964 were the only two charting EPs to get no further than the bottom of the Top Twenty. This time round the sleeve notes of the parent LP were not recycled: instead, Derek Johnson stressed the group's versatility and commended their vocal prowess, while for 'No. 2' James Wynn pointed to their consistency, drive and vitality. Johnson displayed his eye for detail by providing brief but incisive musical analysis of all four tracks; Wynn on the other hand dutifully mentioned his foursome without saying anything of real substance.

Extended players were designed to hold up to 7.5m per side on narrowly spaced microgrooves but were generally much shorter than that for your average commercial pressings. Faced with a track more than 5m long, other markets chose to devote one whole side to 'Little 'B' (see below). Side 1 of our 'No.2' sticks to the conventional two tracks and clocks in at over 7m. The penalty incurred here, as I recall clearly when a brand new copy of the record was played in my favourite record shop, was a constricted dynamic range on any worthwhile transducer: the reproduction was markedly less open than that of the source LP. Come to think of it, the 6m taken up by *The Bandit* and *Cosy* on the first side side of the other record is none too brilliant either ...

The EP Top Ten was already well stocked with instrumentals (Shadows x 2, Tornados x 2, Mr Acker Bilk) when 'Out Of' hit its lowest point on 9 March. It eventually climbed to 3 behind 'Frank Ifield's Hits' and Elvis' 'Kid Galahad' on 13 April, last seeing the Top Ten (after a five-week absence) on 15 June. MM had it on chart for the last three months of the listings' existence, peaking at 5.







The Number Three LP '32 Minutes And 17 Seconds' (approx. 12 Minutes And Seven Seconds whereof constitute the 'Time' allocated to this set), released in October of the previous year, provided the material for this, the first of four EPs for 1963 featuring Cliff and The Shadows, and the only one of them not to chart². By March memories of '32 Minutes..', itself outshone by 'Out Of The Shadows' issued shortly after it, were beginning to fade with a new and much more significant LP in the shops in the shape of 'Summer Holiday'. On all five numbers (cf. Introduction, under II Cliff Richard and The Shadows), examined in detail in Derek Johnson's sleeve notes³ — surely the most informative of those so far encountered in this survey — Cliff had his group behind him. So all their joint contributions to '32 Minutes ...' were recycled, since *It'll Be Me* had figured on the 'Cliff's Hits' EP of November 1962 [EP 25]. Three of the eight Norrie Paramor-backed tracks were to be worked into the March 1964 EP *Don't Talk To Him* [EP 37].


Australia and Denmark too had their own pressings of this EP, cover artwork and all, on catalogue. All five tracks found a place on different releases: the first and the third on 'It'll Be Me' (France: I); the second and the third on Sweden's 'Summer Holiday' (II); the second and fifth on 'Lucky Lips' (France: III); the third on 'Cliff Richard' (Portugal: IV); the fourth on Sweden's 'Lucky Lips (V).







For the first time in the case of The Shadows, here was a UK EP (another one with a front cover portrait which has been reproduced again and again in releases the world over⁴) serving up two hit singles with their respective flipsides: *Guitar Tango* (July 1962) and *Dance On!* (December 1962, a chart-topper) were in fact next in line for transference to this format.

The popularity of both numbers, which received fulsome praise from annotator James Wynn, who stressed the group's command of varying styles, was enough to secure 'Dance On With The Shadows' a high placing in the charts. In the twenty-seven successive weeks in which it had a place in the Top Ten, it hit third place⁵ on five occasions (20 April, 1 June, 8 June, 29 June, 20 July), unable to get past a number of strong contenders: 'Frank Ifield's Hits', 'Kid Galahad' (Elvis), 'Just For Fun' (Bobby Vee & The Crickets), 'Holiday Carnival' (Cliff), 'Billy Fury And The Tornados'. It saw the last of the Top Ten on 21 September.





The 'Summer Holiday' material was coming up for repackaging, but this one was slipped in a month before that at the prompting of Norrie Paramor, for whom a heavily publicised stage show would have been the next best thing to the film ventures that had already contributed substantially to Cliff and The Shadows' reputation as major recording stars. Here was a selection of fresh material, from the show 'Holiday Carnival' which featured Cliff And the group at the ABC Theatre in Blackpool for the summer season of 1963. The Shadows had to do only with the closing track, a light airy composition from the pens of

Bruce Welch and Cliff himself that had been recorded way back in April 1962, probably a reject from the '32 Minutes ...' album but in any case unrelated to the three show tunes that were taped in December.

'Holiday Carnival' ascended to Number One on 8 June, ousting Bobby Vee & The Crickets with 'Just For Fun', but for the next two weeks it was pushed down to second place by 'Frank Ifield's Hits'. Upon climbing back on 29 June, it suffered the same fate the week after. After a dip to 3 on 13 July, it was back at 1. The next week it was the turn of The Beatles with 'Twist And Shout', and there was no going back. 7 September marked the last appearance in the Top Ten. Not bad going for an 'easy listening' EP (John Tobler, 25 Years Of Cliff p. 76)! The uncredited sleeve writer evidently got it right when he claimed that "there is something for everyone in this EP".



A set of familiar songs, but songs strong enough to net a place in the Top Five for this, the first of two EPs sourced from the January LP 'Summer Holiday' (the second, with no Shadows in sight, failed to chart, see footnote to **EP** 27). More significantly, as annotator James Wynn indicated, the four numbers on offer also made up two Number One Singles,

The Next Time / Bachelor Boy (December) and Summer Holiday / Dancing Shoes (February).

In the course of its sixteen-week stay in the EP Top Ten 'Hits From Summer Holiday' climbed to fourth spot on four occasions: in all cases the Top Two were The Beatles' 'Twist And Shout' and 'Gerry and The Pacemakers' 'How Do You Do It?', third place being occupied by 'Frank Ifield's Hits' (3 August), 'Jet And Tony' (10/17 August), 'Ain't Gonna Kiss Ya' (The Searchers; 21 September). It last saw the Top Ten on 28 September.




The two singles pairings consisted of much-loved songs and were eagerly taken up by EP compilers worldwide⁶:

— The Next Time/ Bachelor Boy were found together on various 'Cliff Richard' etc. titles from France (I), Mexico (II) and Portugal (III), and also on Sweden's 'Y'arriva' (IV); they were joined by Summer Holiday on Brazil's 'Cliff Richard & The Shadows' (V); Japan's 'Cliff Richard (~ The Young Ones)' (VI) included Bachelor Boy and Summer Holiday.


Two recent hit singles were waiting to be transferred to EP, Foot Tapper (March) and Atlantis (June). The latter and its vocal flipside were duly netted for this issue but neither the former nor its B-side The Breeze And I was used. Instead, the group's independent contributions to the album 'Summer Holiday', released at the beginning of the year, were chosen to fill side 2: there was the earlier and less commonly encountered version of Foot Tapper, together with two numbers which demonstrated that The Shadows had lost none of their drive and flair. In the sleeve notes Keith Goodwin chose to focus on The Shadows' staying-power in the face of "northern-based beat groups", pointing to their composing talents, much in evidence on this particular record, and closing with the passionate assertion "Make no mistake, The Shadows are on top — and that's exactly where they're going to stay!".

India, Israel and South Africa relabeled the selection, as did Australia (Columbia SEGO 8268) but with artwork derived from the Edgar Brind shot of the group first seen on **EP** 28:



Atlantis was of course a popular target for compilers worldwide: it was combined with its flipside on "Lucky Lips/Atlantis" (Denmark: I), on 'Atlantis' (Denmark Sweden: II) and also (but without the *Foot Tapper* indicated by the title!) on Spain's 'Foot Tapping With The Shadows' (III) ~ Italy's 'Lightning With The Shadows' (IV). 'I Want You To Want Me' was offered without its more illustrious partner by Portugal on an EP of that name (V), in the thick of a multitude of beat group vocals put out on various labels at the time. Finally, France (VI) combined the single *Atlantis* with the *Foot Tapper* of the UK EP.



For detailed discussion of the record's global distribution, cover art and alternative titling refer to the features on Spain (**EP** 15) / Portugal (**EP** 7). Regrettably, the back cover was lacking in all but the most basic explanation of the set's origins ("Recorded in Barcelona on 27th April 1963", as if that was the whole story), with nothing at all about programme choice.

September was a productive and satisfying month for the group, with the release of a hit single, *Shindig*, and *two* hit EPs. There had not been two in the same month before, and there would not be again. The 'Foot Tapping' set was ripe for release but the Shadows' wholly new Spanish set was pressing too, constituting as it did a perfect complement to the purely vocal material on Cliff Richard's contemporaneous 'When In Spain' — an LP of fresh material from him was long overdue. 'Los Shadows' with its novel content made the Top Five (the group would only achieve that again with **EP** 40 'Wonderful Life', to which they contributed one track of their own); 'Foot Tapping With The Shadows', which entered the charts a couple of weeks later, made the Top Ten. The former achieved fourth position in six successive weeks (5 October–9 November), behind powerful releases from The Beatles and The Searchers; 'Foot Tapping' managed a *10*, *9* and *7* before disappearing from the Top Ten on 9 November.


The final EP of the year to feature Cliff and The Shadows (though the group did not figure on the opening track) once again resorted to linking two high-performing singles: tracks 3–4 from April, a Number Four, and tracks 1–2 from August, a Number Two. It

did not turn out to be much of a "best-seller", as James Wynn confidently predicted it would be in the sleeve notes. At its highest point it would not get near 'Los Shadows' or even 'Foot Tapping With The Shadows', still less The Searchers or The Beatles.

The last Shadows EP of the year, another Top Tenner, incorporated hit singles material, but with *Foot Tapper* and *Atlantis* already made use of three months before (the former actually represented by an "alternative" version, see at **EP** 32), *Shindig* was the only remaining candidate. To its flipside were appended a pair of randomly chosen numbers

from the first LP; a couple of untapped items from 1959 might have awakened more interest (*Saturday Dance*, say, and *Jet Black* studio version), for their rarity value if for no other reason; or (much better) two notable B-sides, *Quatermasster's Stores* and *The Breeze And I*.

The EP was equipped with notes by Derek Johnson that contain some uncharacteristic inaccuracies but also the interesting suggestion, which I have not seen anywhere else, that *Theme From A Filleted Place* would have proved a hit had it been released as a single. It briefly penetrated the Top Ten (at 9, on 28 December), with 'Los Shadows' still holding on (that week at 5).

Both 'Los Shadows' and Cliff Richard's ('Shadowless') 'Love Songs' EP could offer the record-buying public something new. It says something for the continuing appeal of the group that such an unenterprising concoction as 'Shindig With The Shadows' got anywhere near the higher reaches of the chart given the quality and diversity of the music scene as 1963 was drawing to a close. *RR*'s Top Ten, 28 December:





















The silhouette of the front cover (see for discussion the feature on France, at **EP** 16) provided a refreshing variation on the standard group portraiture; the tick-marks so beloved of comics to point up the notion of a ruckus or rumpus inherent in the title added a further nice touch. Australia dispensed with this artwork (for which cf. again the feature on France, at **EP** 11), unlike India, Israel and South Africa where it was adopted as it stood:
