### **PART ONE**

## REVIEW OF UK VINYL RELEASES

## 1959-1980

## I: SINGLES

### **A: THE SHADOWS**

Between 1959 and 1980, 45 Singles were released, amounting for our purposes to 84 different tracks, since two issues made use of titles on earlier Singles ( $\#163^1 = \#175$ ), and one A- and one B-side were credited to Hank Marvin (#152, 157).

The proportion of vocal material proved to be pretty high, twenty tracks in all, but their distribution was uneven. Four of the six sides issued in 1959 (#2, 12) were vocals, but when the group broke through with APACHE instrumental Singles naturally followed on. The first "vocal" to emerge was actually a narration, WHAT A LOVELY TUNE, released in 1962; this was followed up with one vocal proper in 1963, one in 1964, two in 1965, three in 1966, three in 1968, three in 1975, one in 1976, one in 1978. Eleven were A-sides, nine B-sides.

16 of the 84 tracks appeared also (usually prior to Single release) on Shadows LPs, though not before 1973: of these seven were A-sides, nine B-sides. A further three were featured on Cliff LPs (see #97, 107).

The first UK Single to appear in Stereo format was SLAUGHTER ON TENTH AVENUE in 1969 (#157); for an overview of later Stereo/ Mock Stereo issues of the majority of these Mono releases consult *CD Guide* pp. 13–16. Some of the Stereo issues turned out to harbour variations on their Mono counterparts: see in particular under #74 (ATLANTIS), #85 (GERONIMO), #115 (STINGRAY), #146 (BOMBAY DUCK).

29 of the 45 releases charted: eleven made the Top Five (including five Number Ones), five the Top Ten, eight the Top Twenty, four the Top Twenty-Five; only one failed to make the Top Forty, THE DREAMS I DREAM (#140). Leaving aside the "running-in" period of 1959, the first outright flop came as late as 1967 (#150, TOMORROW'S CANCELLED). None of the dozen Singles released between July 1960 (#19 APACHE) and September 1963 (#79 SHINDIG) failed to penetrate the Top Ten. (Cliff Richard though hung on rather longer, see on #116.)

On the evidence assembled in this book<sup>2</sup>, the UK releases were shared by thirty-one other countries altogether; a number of course (France and Japan are prime examples) issued pairings of their own devising, along with a random selection of UK clones. If we leave out of the reckoning the first and last releases (#2, 191), both of which were, for different reasons, issued commercially in the UK alone, and also the irregular trio APACHE/ WONDERFUL LAND/ FBI (#163 =  $\neq$  175), the distribution of which was clearly restricted deliberately<sup>3</sup>, the average number of countries involved per issue was eleven. The Eurovision entry LET ME BE THE ONE seems to have led the field (18 outlets), closely followed by WONDERFUL LAND and RHYTHM AND GREENS (16), then GERONIMO/ DON'T MAKE MY BABY BLUE/ A PLACE IN THE SUN (15), then APACHE/ DANCE ON!/ SHINDIG/ MAROC 7 (14), all the other major hits clocking up between 13 and 8. Most UK pairings were issued, it appears, in Holland (35), closely followed by Germany (34), New Zealand (33), Australia (32), South Africa (30), the remaining countries failing to reach the 30-mark to a greater or lesser degree.

### **B: CLIFF RICHARD AND THE SHADOWS**

Joint Singles almost petered out after 1966: a B-side was put out in 1967 (#145, a No. 9), an A-side in 1968 (#155, a No. 21).

Between 1959 and 1966, 36 Singles were issued<sup>4</sup>, comprising 72 tracks. 59 tracks were with group-accompaniment, only 13 were without: 10 A-sides,

showcasing big ballads, 3 B-sides. Only a couple of the 36 releases were entirely without The Shadows: 'The Twelfth Of Never' / 'I'm Afraid To Go Home' in 1964 (a No. 8), and 'The Minute You're Gone' / 'Just Another Guy' in 1965 (a No. 1).

To turn to the chart performance of the 34 releases in which The Shadows did have some involvement: only the first of the three "Export" Singles registered in the charts, 'Gee Whiz It's You' (#29) hitting 4, but the level of success attained by the remaining 31 was remarkable:

Of the 59 Cliff+Shadows Singles tracks referred to above, as many as 19 also appeared on LP<sup>5</sup>, four of these featuring on the "Exports", the rest on regular releases, which sought to capitalise on the popularity of Cliff movies (*The Young Ones, Summer Holiday, Wonderful Life, Finders Keepers*; also the pantomime *Aladdin*); an exception was 'It'll Be Me' (#58), which appeared also on *32 Minutes* ... To be added to these is the variant on 'The Young Ones': the Single version (#46) had strings which were lacking on that of the LP (see under #45 in the "Annual Surveys").

Most unusually, 'Living Doll' (#9) had been included on an EP (#5); in the case of 'A Voice In The Wilderness', the EP (#13) and Single (#14) versions were different.

### II: EPs

### A: THE SHADOWS

26 EPs (if we include #141, *Thunderbirds Are Go!*, which featured The Shadows exclusively on three of its four numbers), containing 106 tracks (of which eleven were vocals and one a narration), were released in the UK on the Columbia label over seven successive years (1961–1967). Normally there were four tracks on each record. Three issues had five: #81 *Foot Tapping With The Shadows*, which combined a popular Singles-pairing with three numbers from *Summer Holiday*; #102, the score from the feature-film *Rhythm And Greens*; and #136, *The Sound Of The Shadows No. 3*, this a market-ploy perhaps to drum up interest after the chart-failure of *Nos 1 & 2* (#126, 129).

All were issued in Mono. Only twenty-one tracks over five issues were offered in Stereo too, and eight of those had already been made available on a parent Album, *Out Of The Shadows* (see #66, 72). The other three issues with Stereo alternatives were *The Shadows* (#25), *The Boys* (#59), and *Rhythm And Greens* (#102); it is not wholly clear why two other important "themed" EPs, *Los Shadows* (#80) and *Thunderbirds Are Go!* ( $\neq$  141), were marketed in Mono only<sup>6</sup>. In any event, all but one of the 106 tracks are now available in Stereo, the exception being LADY PENELOPE from *Thunderbirds* (see *CD Guide* p. 282)<sup>7</sup>.

The first full EP by the group, entitled simply *The Shadows* (#25), contained brand new material; this, together with the following two issues, which bore

more imaginative titles (#35 The Shadows To The Fore, #48 Spotlight On The Shadows), and offered a number of hit Singles including APACHE, FBI and KON-TIKI, topped the EP charts. The three clocked up between them a staggering 261 weeks in residence! When a switch was made to LP material with The Shadows No. 2 (#50) there was not the same level of success, and it was only with an issue containing fresh numbers that the next, and last, Number One was achieved (#59, the dazzling The Boys). None the less, of the twenty-six as many as twenty charted, fourteen making the Top Ten, with two (#66, 69) reaching a very creditable Number Three and remaining on chart for twenty-one and thirty-two weeks respectively. The first one not to register, the seventeenth in the series, came as late as December 1964 (#108, the second instalment from the LP Dance With The Shadows, see on #100).

The 106 tracks referred to above can be broken down as follows:

#### A

The Shadows To The Fore (#35) was the first in a series of EPs rounding up various A/B Singles, 33 in all, from the years 1960 to 1966:

- (i) All A-sides from APACHE in 1960 to THEME FOR YOUNG LOVERS in 1964, though FOOT TAPPER was represented not by the Single but by the "film" version (see #81). From the rest of 1964, and from 1965 to 1966, there was no representation in EP format for THE RISE AND FALL OF FLINGEL BUNT, MARY-ANNE, DON'T MAKE MY BABY BLUE, I MET A GIRL, THE DREAMS I DREAM (all but the first vocals).
- (ii) As for the B-sides issued between 1960 and 1966, no room was found for the following: QUATERMASSTER'S STORES, BACK HOME, THE BREEZE AND I, IT'S A MAN'S WORLD, THE MIRACLE, CHU-CHI, LATE NIGHT SET, WILL YOU BE THERE, SCOTCH ON THE SOCKS.

#### B

45 LP tracks in all were used, sourced from:

- *The Shadows* (#50, 54, partially #86). Four of the fourteen tracks were bypassed: BLUE STAR, FIND ME A GOLDEN STREET, THAT'S MY DESIRE, MY RESISTANCE IS LOW.
- *Out Of The Shadows* (#66, 72), eight of the thirteen tracks. Unrepresented: BO DIDDLEY, SOUTH OF THE BORDER, SPRING IS NEARLY HERE, ARE THEY ALL LIKE YOU, SOME ARE LONELY.
- Dance With The Shadows (#100, 108, 114, partially #122). All fourteen tracks were put out in EP format.
- *The Sound Of The Shadows* (#126, 129, 136). All but one track was used, the vocal A LITTLE BITTY TEAR.

Of the remaining material (a mere twenty-eight items), six issues were composed entirely or partially of numbers appearing for the first time, typifying the group's mastery of different styles:

- #25 Four tracks with a "western" flavour
- Four contrasting numbers from *The Boys*
- #80 Four "Spanish" tracks
- #102 Five tracks stemming from work on the feature film *Rhythm*And Greens, one having been released shortly before as an ASingle
- #110 Three previously released tracks, but also the rare and evocative FRIENDS
- #141 Three *Thunderbirds* tracks (together with one contribution from Cliff Richard)

### D

Three further issues incorporated material already available on Cliff LPs:

- #81 Three tracks from Summer Holiday (#65)
- #110 ME OH MY from *Aladdin* (#107)
- #147 Four tracks from Finders Keepers (#143) & Cinderella (#144)

To these may be added the two otherwise unissued numbers featured on Cliff EPs (#5: CHINCHILLA; #13: BONGO BLUES).

The UK releases were shared by fifteen other countries altogether, the average for each issue falling between four and five: a representative example is furnished by *Out Of The Shadows* (#66): this was issued also in Australia, Denmark, Holland, India and New Zealand. It was those EPs offering material not previously released that were distributed most widely: *Los Shadows* + title-variations (#80/ 9 countries in all), *The Boys* (#59/ 8), *Thunderbirds Are Go!* (#141/ 7), *The Shadows* (#25/ 6), *Rhythm And Greens* (#102/ 6), *Themes From Aladdin* (#110/ 6); an exception was *Shindig With The Shadows* (#86/ 6).

Way out in front in this sector of the market was Australia (sharing all 26 issues), then New Zealand (18), India (18), Holland (14), S Africa (13). Certain countries had no UK-sourced releases and struck out on their own. Notable among these was France, where the EP was immensely influential, far more so than the Single: see Appendix 3.

### **B: CLIFF RICHARD AND THE SHADOWS**

The group first appeared on a Cliff EP in 1959, Serious Charge [#5] (then as The Drifters), and for the last time in 1967, Cinderella [#148]. During this period they figured throughout or on part of thirty-four Cliff EPs all told (excluded here is the predominantly Shadows Thunderbirds Are Go!, see beginning of A above). It is these releases, and not the further ten in which The Shadows as a group did not participate<sup>8</sup>, that concern us in this survey.

Usually there were four tracks, two per side. A few LP-sourced issues accommodated five (#28, 30, 31, 44, 70; also #90, a blend of Album and Singles tracks); exceptionally, the *Cliff* Album, with its short and snappy rock numbers, generated two six-trackers ( $\neq$  6, 7).

Of the 146 tracks in question, the group backed Cliff on 111, appeared in their own right on a further five<sup>9</sup>, and did not figure at all on thirty. Seventeen of the thirty-four issues were in Mono only, seventeen in both Mono and Stereo. Twenty were LP-sourced; five drew on A/B Singles (#24, 49, 62, 83, 130); five consisted of wholly original material (#1310, 43, 73, 88, 124); four were hybrids: #5 (originals + one Single), #90 (two Singles + 3 LP tracks), #94 (two Singles + two English versions of foreign-language LP tracks), #101 (two Singles + two LP tracks).

Leaving out of account the first three releases, for which no EP chart was in place, twelve of the thirty-one remaining in our list failed to register, the first as early as (late) 1961, Listen To Cliff No. 2 (#44). Of the nineteen that did make the Top Twenty, as many as twelve found a place in the Top Five; there were four Number Ones, #13 Expresso Bongo, #24 Cliff's Silver Discs (containing four highly popular A-Singles), #53 Hits From 'The Young Ones', and — a surprise latecomer — #73, Holiday Carnival<sup>11</sup>.

### III: LPs

### A: THE SHADOWS

By the time The Shadows had their first LP in the shops in 1961, they had already made a major contribution to four LPs from Cliff Richard, enjoying their share of chart success in the process (these reached 4, 2, 2, and 2 respectively). But *The Shadows* soared right to the top of the Album charts, as did its follow-up, *Out Of The Shadows*, in 1962. Their next four original Albums were also high achievers, despite the fact that from 1964 through to 1967 the group's hold on the Singles market was not nearly as strong as it had been in the years 1960–1963: *Dance With The Shadows*<sup>12</sup> (1964) climbed to 2, *The Sound Of The Shadows* (1965) to 4, *Shadow Music* (1966) to 5, *Jigsaw* (1967) to 8. The ensuing six originals, issued between late 1967 and mid-1977, performed disappointingly, with a couple just making the Top Thirty and three not charting at all. With *String Of Hits* in 1979 they were back at the top, with the follow-up *Another String* ... (almost but not quite a compilation Album!) penetrating the Top Twenty in 1980.

Various collections of previously released material were marketed in the UK in our period, most of them to no effect. There were two notable exceptions: *The Shadows Greatest Hits* (1963, reaching 2), and the spectacularly successful 20 Golden Greats (1977, a chart-topper).

The Shadows, once established, were first and foremost instrumentalists, but a number of their major LPs found room for vocal tracks: there were three on *The Shadows*, three on *Out Of The Shadows*, two on *Dance With The Shadows*, three on *The Sound Of The Shadows*, four on *Shadow Music*, four (plus one part-vocal) on *From Hank, Bruce, Brian And John*, six ("Eurovision" material) on *Specs Appeal*; there were none on *Jigsaw, Shades Of Rock, Rockin' With Curly Leads, Tasty, String Of Hits*.

Nearly all The Shadows' LPs, whether original or compilation, were widely distributed, as a glance at the main entries under the various titles will show. Here are just a few facts and figures, based on the data available for the

listings in this book, relating to the twelve major studio Albums<sup>13</sup>: the UK releases were shared by 32 different countries in all, with a maximum of 18 countries (for Out Of The Shadows) and a minimum of 11 (Rockin' With Curly Leads). All twelve were released at one time or another in Australia, France, Germany, New Zealand and South Africa.

The Shadows also appeared in their own right on Cliff Albums, which will be considered next.

#### B: CLIFF RICHARD AND THE SHADOWS

Collaboration for LP releases was quite extensive from 1959 through to 1968<sup>14</sup> (the live production *Thank You Very Much* was the next fresh offering, over a decade later): there were seventeen original joint releases over this ten-year period, though the extent of the group's input varied from one issue to another, as it did with the compilations put out in 1963 (Cliff's Hit Album), 1965 (More Hits By Cliff), 1969 (The Best Of Cliff), and 1977 (40 Golden Greats).

Of the 267 tracks on the eighteen "originals", The Shadows joined Cliff for 132 and part of a further track, and contributed 29 and part of a thirtieth in their own right, as follows:

- #3 Cliff (1959): three live numbers, JET BLACK, DRIFTIN' and BE-BOP-A-LULA, the last a vocal.
- #41 21 Today (1961): an instrumental accompanied by "party" chatter: HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO YOU.
- #45 The Young Ones (1961 Mono/ 1962 Stereo): PEACE PIPE and THE SAVAGE.
- #65 Summer Holiday (1963): LES GIRLS, ROUND AND ROUND and FOOT TAPPER ("film" version).
- #97 Wonderful Life (1964): WALKIN' and THEME FOR YOUNG LOVERS.
- #107 Aladdin (1964): ME OH MY (vocal), LITTLE PRINCESS and GENIE WITH THE LIGHT BROWN LAMP.

- #143 Finders Keepers (1966): MY WAY (vocal), SPANISH MUSIC (opening of medley, taken up by Cliff + Shadows), and an instrumental sequence comprising FINDERS KEEPERS: MY WAY: PAELLA: FIESTA.
- #144 Cinderella (1967): THE FLYDER AND THE SPY and AUTUMN.
- #154 Established 1958 (1968): seven tracks by The Shadows, two of them vocals.
- #183 Thank You Very Much (live): four instrumentals from the group.

The chart showing for the above noted twenty-two Albums taken together was most impressive, with only three weak performers (#121 When In Rome a failure, #144 Cinderella/#154 Established 1958 both stalling at 30):
